than their own specific assignment.

The classrooms and science facilities for the senior students are of high standard. By contrast, the three classrooms for

the lower secondary school are very basic - 4 walls, blackboard and desks. The Primary classrooms are little better, but

are at least adorned by a greater variety of equipment and instructional materials. The two temporary remedial rooms are

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comfortably furnished and well-equipped with resource materials.

Plans are presently being developed to upgrade facilities and resources at Highgate:
